## From Our Minister



Dear Whidbey friends,

I'm looking forward to the new program year at UUCWI, relishing the adventures of the summer, and feeling grateful for the many blessings of being part of this congregation.

Those of you who've been around for awhile probably know that every year the Worship committee selects a theme for the year's services; this year it's "Sources of Spiritual Inspiration". In August, we reflected upon Nature as a source of spiritual inspiration and experimented with our very first Animal Blessing service.

September's theme is "New Beginnings", corresponding with the kickoff of our congregational year, new programs being considered, new projects in the works. One of those projects is something an ad hoc committee of the board has been working on: a Covenant of Right Relations to help us as we deal with the little and not so little ups and downs in the community.

Even the most loving groups (as we are, I think) need ways of dealing with conflict. We tend to be hopeful that disagreements will just go away because we hate to be in conflict. Some conflicts do just fade away; they aren't important enough to worry about. But others cause hurt feelings, anger, and can even grow into infighting serious enough to threaten the stability of the congregation. Years and years ago, that even happened here.

A Covenant of Right Relations, agreed upon by members of the congregation, gives a framework for handling the kind of day to day differences of opinion that frequently arise as well as ways to work through larger disputes that occasionally occur. It's a way of reminding us that respect and courtesy are major requirements of our life together and that understanding of differing points of view is achieved by thoughtful listening.

On Sept. 26, I will be saying more about a possible Covenant of Right Relations and at a

"potluck with a purpose" following the service, you will have a chance to read through and discuss the first draft that the committee has come up with. A leader at each table will take notes and the committee will regroup to consider the suggestions made.

The process of refining the Covenant of Right Relations will continue until it is ready to be ratified by the congregation as a body. It is important that the thoughts expressed in the Covenant represent the needs of the membership. This will not be a harsh or punitive document, but rather a call to be our best selves as members of the UUCWI community.

Dr. Melissa Harris-Lacewell has said: "To love one another does not mean to agree about everything. Love is in part about a willingness to put aside what we are convinced is right in order to be careful enough to listen to one another. "

The Interfaith Amigos from Seattle are Sheik Jamal Rahman, a Sufi Islamic minister at the Interfaith Community Church in Ballard; Rabbi Ted Falcon, a Reform rabbi who has founded synagogues in Los Angeles and Seattle; and Pastor Don Mackenzie, an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ (Congregational), recently retired. They received national recognition as the subject of a November 24, 2009 New York Times article "Three Clergymen, Three Faiths, One Friendship," a CBS News report and several NPR interviews. They have given many presentations and workshops throughout the nation and have co-authored a book, *Getting to the Heart of Interfaith*.

Island churches, faith communities and peace groups involved in the vigil planning and participation are the Tahoma One Drop Zen Buddhist Monastery, Langley Methodist Church, St. Hubert's Roman Catholic, Trinity Lutheran, Whidbey Friends Worship Group (Quakers), St. Augustine's Episcopal Peace Fellowship, and Unitarian Universalists. As in previous interfaith vigils, recording artist, Karl Olsen of the Brothers Four, will lead the gathering in song.

There will be beverages and cookies immediately following the service. This will allow for further interfaith discussions with the Interfaith Amigos.

have an incredible group of teachers and are looking forward to our new year starting September 5th.

Our Wonder Play class (for infants through kindergarten age children) is led by Dawn C. Dawn worked in corporate advertising for many years, but her love of art and children blossomed when she moved to Whidbey Island over thirteen years ago. She has produced two local musical puppet theater shows in addition to working for after school programs, homeless shelters, home schools, and puppet theatre workshops. Our Spirit Play class (for 1st – 5th grade students) is led by Peter L. Peter is a dedicated father and husband, dancer and gardener, lover and seeker. ## Social Responsibility Committee

The Social Responsibility Committee (SRC) wants your participation! The first meeting of the new church year will be held on Sunday, September 5, following the worship service.

Why an SRC? This is the group that will guide UUCWI in contributing to and participating in the immediate and greater communities. Our principles include the words “Peace”, “Justice”, “Equity”, and “Compassion.” But what are we really doing to see that these happen in our community – or in the world?

This past year, the SRC supported the local Habitat for Humanity project, the Whidbey Veterans Resource Center, the Save the Forest (Trillium) campaign and more. SRC identifies the recipients of the dedicated offerings each month. Over \$6,000 from these went to such organizations as Planned Parenthood, Good Cheer, South Whidbey Youth Connection and the Red Cross. Most recently, over \$1,000 was collected for the Trillium effort.

While SRC has made the decision to focus its efforts on Whidbey Island needs (see the Purpose/Mission Statement below), it is a part of a regional coalition of similar committees of other UU congregations. The sharing of ideas and priorities is important and inspiring. SRC also stays in touch with the national UUSC.

And, as a side note, SRC helps UUCWI become more visible which always helps in membership growth. It is the SRC activities that will show people who we are, what we believe in and how we act on our principles. Please join the SRC!
